into what you guys need to know

alright so let's say you set up your

shoot location you got your ring light

your tripod all that ready to go but you

leave this as your background when I

look back in my old videos I actually

can't believe I didn't think to clean

00:34

off the background it's such an easy 00:36

thing to do to just clean up your

background it should only take like 10 00:39

or 15 minutes it'll make your whole

video feel more polished because you

actually took the time to make sure it 00:45

looks good I also like to add some kind 00:47

of light to the background to make it a 00:48

little more interesting so you could do 00:50

like a neon sign a table lamp and LED 00:52

strips something like that it's just 00:54

gonna make your background a lot more

interesting okay the next thing you can 00:57

focus on to make your videos and photos 00:59

better is creating a sense of depth so

each shot pretty much has the foreground 01:03

middle ground and the background so I've

seen this challenge going around the

Michaels challenge you just go to a 01:08

craft store and try and make it look

cool and this is like the perfect way to 01:12

show how you can create a sense of depth 01:14

even in the most random places so what

we're gonna do is position my friend

Mackenzie in the middle of the flower so 01:20

we have some in the foreground and some 01:22

of the background next I'm going to grab

this fake plant and I'm gonna put it up 01:26

to the lens to make it kind of blurry 01:27

and just add a little bit more to the 01:29

foreground so this is gonna make it look 01:31

like we're actually shooting outside and 01:33

maybe there's a tree or something in

front of the lens so it looks kind of 01:37

cool also for this particular shoot it

came in handy for blocking out signs

that showed we're in a craft store I

also tried it with this yellow wreath so 01:44

you just kind of hold it up in front of 01:46

her and have it in the foreground just 01:48

adding a little something to the 01:49

foreground can really make portraits a 01:51

lot more interesting is when you pay 01:53

attention to creating a sense of depth 01:55

you're gonna be able to get a shot like

this rather than just a basic wide shot 01:59

like this one next thing to know are a 02:02

few photography composition

02:04

you don't have to absolutely follow 02:06

these or anything they're just really

common rules that you'll learn in any

photography class so the first one is 02:11

the rule of thirds this is basically the

idea that if you had a grid the points

02:15 that intersect are the points that you

02:18

should have your subject or whatever you

want to draw the viewer to you if you're 02:22

shooting a travel photo like this one

then you probably would want a person or 02:25

a landmark to be on the points that 02:27

intersect and you can always do like a 02:29

centered photo especially if there's a 02:30

lot of symmetry it's pretty much to 02:32

avoid shots like this where someone's 02:34

just randomly on the side of the photo 02:36

and if you want to shoot like this you

can actually turn a three by three grid 02:39

on in your camera so that way you can 02:42

easily see if you're lining it up this

will also help you level your shot so 02:46

it's not going to be crooked the next

one is leading lines so this is

02:50

basically when you use the lines in a 02:52

photo to direct the viewers eye so you

can do this with a staircase in this

photo you can see the bridge has these 02:57

leading lines and they're kind of 02:58

drawing you to it I think staircases are 03:00

one of the easiest ways to incorporate 03:01

this so if you guys want to try it out 03:03

and go find a cool staircase like this 03:05

one so add McKenzie sit about in the 03:07

middle of the stairs but I shot at a low 03:10

angle so that it feels like the stairs

go on and on for a really long time I 03:14

just think this makes the photo look 03:15

more interesting and dynamic then if she <sup>03:17</sup>

was just standing against a wall or 03:19

something like that so this is how some

of them turned out all right so the last

rule is called a frame within a frame

and this is when you use something in 03:26

the shot to frame your shot so something 03:28

like a doorway a mural painting it can

be anything that frames a shot though 03:32

you can see in this one that's sort of 03:34

felted they framed it so it's pretty

03:36

simple you just find a frame in a real 03:37

life and put your subject in it in a

03:40

creative way so here's some examples of <sup>03:42</sup>

the ones that we shot this day everyone <sup>03:45</sup>

loves a great slow-mo montage it looks

really cool right but it doesn't look

03:49

very good if you don't shoot it in the 03:51

right frame rate so if you shoot it in 03:53

24 frames per second and try and slow it <sup>03:55</sup>

down it's gonna look all choppy and

weird like this and you definitely don't 03:59

want that that does not look good so a 04:01

lot of cameras can shoot in 60 frames

per second so if you want to slow down 04:04

your footage make sure that you're

shooting in a frame rate that's at least 04:07

double of what you normally would 04:11

and the next tip is to make sure that 04:12

you don't overdo your ISO so if you're

shooting in manual and you have the ISO 04:17

set too high it's gonna have all this

noise and look kind of grainy and just 04:21

overall terrible like this compared to 04:24

how it looks here this is what I would 04:26

normally set it at you can see it looks

pretty bright there's no noise it just

looks better all around so here's an old 04:32

video to show you guys like before I did

not understand this it's it looks

04:36

terrible a lot of times this will be 04:38

tricky if you're shooting something at 04:39

night because you'll want to bump the 04:40

ISO up but just be careful not to do too 04:43

much so it's different for every camera

model so you'll have to test it out 04:46

yourself but generally most don't look

very good over 6000 ISO so that's the 04:51
